



City break in Toronto

With direct flights from British Airways, starting this May, make reaching the vibrant cosmopolitan city of Toronto easier than ever. Not only does it have some of the best restaurants, bars and nightlife in the country, as well as a huge range of summer activities, from urban chic and boat tours on Lake Ontario to festivals just about every week, but it's perfectly placed for some world-class trips. Niagara Falls, 80 miles south, and Muskoka Lakes, where the city's rich and famous play, 140 miles north, are both must-sees.

Details BA's new direct flights from London to Toronto cost from £367 return. The Shangri-La Toronto has a gorgeous design and excellent food. Book from £435 a night (0800 333337, shangri-la.com)

Drive the Viking Trail

On a new self-drive itinerary follows the 1,800-mile Viking Trail, one of Canada's most well-known but best-kept secrets, hugging the rugged coastline of Newfoundland. The route includes the 10-year-old village at L'Anse aux Meadows — the oldest known European settlement of the new world. The real highlight, though, is the province itself. Newfoundland is unlike anywhere else on the continent, an isolated island with its own language, dialect, architecture and food. See 1,000 Atlantic puffins crowd the cliffs at Witless Bay and whales off the coast of Anthony, stop off at tiny fishing villages for fresh-caught salmon and sail through the 2,000ft-deep, glacier-carved fjords of Gros Morne National Park.

accommodation, car hire, select activities, internal flights to St John's, where the trip departs, and international flights to Montreal or Toronto, costs from £2,089pp (020 3588 6130, westernoriental.com)

17 Go hiking in Quebec

The 60-mile Traversée de Charlevoix is one of the best long-distance hiking trails east of the Rockies, and this new trip from World Expeditions makes it easy — and enjoyable — to complete. Hiking hut to hut between backcountry refuges, each with wood-burning stoves, proper beds and gorgeous views, means cosy nights and home-cooked meals at the end of each day, and because your luggage is transferred ahead for you there are no heavy bags to carry. Crossing the most stunning parts of Quebec, from the breathtaking panoramas of Hautes-Gorges-de-la-Rivière-Malbaie National Park to the caribou herds of Grands-Jardins National Park, this is the business class of backpacking.

18 Play golf and cruise the coast of Nova Scotia

This new trip from One Ocean Expeditions combines small-ship adventure cruising around the spectacular coastline of Nova Scotia with the chance to tee off on some of the best golf courses in North America. Highlights include the 36-hole Cabot Links, along the stunning seascapes of Cape Breton Island, and the five-star championship

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The trip

Travelling on board the Silver Spirit, you'll traverse the Atlantic in style, enjoying stops along the Canadian coastline as you discover the unspoilt beauty of Newfoundland and Nova Scotia. After a two-day stopover in Boston you will then disembark in New York ready for a thrilling seven-day escorted tour to see the best of the Big Apple, Philadelphia, Washington and a cruise to Niagara Falls

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Crowbush Cove, overlooking the north shore dunes of Prince Edward Island. A range of activities are laid on for non-golfing partners, including shore hikes, bike rides and boat tours, with plenty of time together in between to enjoy the culture, wildlife and outstanding natural beauty of Canada's east coast.

19 Take the Ocean Train

Travelling from the big city of Montreal, on the southern tip of Quebec, to Halifax, on the eastern shores of Nova Scotia, this 836-mile overnight sleeper journey is little known outside the country, but is one of the best ways to experience Canada's wild Atlantic coast. Staying in a private sleeper cabin, with use of a restaurant and panoramic dome car, you will travel through French Canada's most picturesque countryside, watching the crash of surf as the quaint fishing villages of the Maritimes gradually rattle into view. Two days each are spent in three of Canada's most historic cities: Montreal, Quebec and Halifax.

Details The seven-night trip, including six nights in hotels, one in a cabin on the train and a choice of three excursions, costs from US\$2,590pp. Flights to Montreal cost extra (0800 9870337, canadainnervations.com)

20 Spot whales along Iceberg Alley

Every spring enormous icebergs are calved in Greenland and sent, with the prevailing winds, direct to the east coast of Newfoundland and Labrador, drifting down a route known as Iceberg Alley. At the same time up to 22 species of whales return to these waters, including blue, minke and the world's largest population of humpbacks. This new trip from Discover the World combines both events in a 12-day road trip that includes an iceberg safari cruise, boat trips into the towering fjords of Gros Morne and the chance to snorkel with humpback whales.

Details An 11-night trip, including car hire and all excursions, costs from £1,730pp. Flights to St John's, Newfoundland, where the trip departs, cost extra (01737 214291, discover-the-world.co.uk)
